What is HEART?

Homeless Engagement Assistance Response Team (HEART) is Urban Alchemy's communitybased public safety response program focused on those who are experiencing nonviolent homelessness, addiction, and/or or mental health crises.

By sending Urban Alchemy to respond, cities can refocus police on essential activities and protect the safety of those who need help.

Because 96% of our staff is formerly incarcerated or homeless themselves, we empathize with people in crisis. Our Practitioners are unarmed and trained to talk to people in crisis without judgment, helping to ensure their presence de-escalates situations safely.

Frequently Asked Questions

What is Urban Alchemy?

Urban Alchemy is a nonprofit organization that hires individuals who were once incarcerated and trains them to transform people and places through respect, compassion, and love. We provide services that heal communities challenged by the intersection of extreme poverty, mental illness, addiction, and homelessness.

Who does Urban Alchemy employ to do this work?

Approximately 96% of our Practitioners have been incarcerated and/or experienced homelessness, and over 80% of Urban Alchemy employees are Black or people of color. These shared experiences create a deep bond and a spirit of mutual support that produces thriving employees who do outstanding work.

Does Urban Alchemy perform a police or security function?

Urban Alchemy Practitioners build trust with both housed and unhoused individuals by engaging with everyone in the community, making emotional deposits to foster relationships. When a crisis occurs, they can leverage this trust to de-escalate situations, redirect behavior, and connect individuals to services.

What kind of training do you provide staff?

Practitioners complete rigorous training built around transforming trauma into resilience. Every Practitioner must understand our core values of respect, integrity, empathy, empowerment, self-discipline, selfcontrol, and self-esteem, beginning with 40 hours of classroom instruction followed by 40 hours of on-the-job training. This ensures that Practitioners are equipped to bring peace to struggling communities with respect, compassion, and love.

Why the focus on hiring those who are previously incarcerated?

Urban Alchemy provides people who were incarcerated with meaningful employment and opportunities to give back to their communities.

In our experience, the best people to facilitate the kind of healing we envision are those who have experienced that level of healing themselves, and the work that Practitioners do is part of their own healing process.
